A quilt containing the 20 winning blocks will be hand quilted by volunteers during the 2016 Marshfield Fair. The finished quilt will be raffled off in the year 2017. All entrants' names are included in the raffle. The sashing, batting, and backing are donated by Tumbleweed Quilt Shop of Barnstable, MA offering quilting classes, bolts and bolts of beautiful cottons plus mail order service for fabric, supplies, and books - an irresistible store! Many thanks to Tumbleweed.

Pattern: 150th Marshfield Fair Sashing: Fabric to be decided later

Method: Using an original design or traditional block, themed fabrics or applique, make a block by hand or machine to reflect the theme. Do not back the block.

Size: Block should be 12 ½" unfinished.

Prizes: 1st prize: \$50.00, 19 Runners-up: \$15.00, Quilt pin for the 25th block entered. Mail To: PBQBC, Marshfield Fair, Box 5, Marshfield, MA 02050

Deadline: June 1, 2016

Marshfield Fair cannot be responsible for the blocks, but we've never lost one yet.

To Submit:

- 1. Attach entry form to back of each block with safety pin. You may submit any number of blocks; only one can win.
- 2. Photograph your block before you send it!
- 3. Enclose your email address and indicate if you want to know your block got here safely and on time.
- 4. For winners and next year's information after judging, enclose a stamped, self- addressed long envelope marked "winners" in lower left hand corner.
- 5. For judges' comments, add "comments" on that corner.
- 6. For return of non donated block, enclose self addressed 6x9 envelope with adequate postage attached.
- 7. Blocks donated, unspecified or without return envelope as described above are made into quilts for charities.
- 8. The junior competition is for youth ages 5 18. All the above rules and entry dates apply.

H.O.M.E. stands for Homeowners Organized for More Employment, was organized in 1970 as a grassroots organization to assist families who had been dispossessed of living and land. In an interview (1987) of Lucy Poulin, founder, she stated that Hancock County (Bucksport, Me.) resembles the Third World. Seven out of state paper companies owned 88% of the land. Only six per cent is owned by year round residents. One third of the populations lives in poverty; 30% are drop outs and 25% are illiterate.

At the time, Lucy was a nun at the "Hermitage" when a local woman knocked on the door and asked if she (Lucy) could help her sell quilts. That simple question was the beginning of a cooperative and a community. People brought crafts to sell, volunteers from different social groups, e.g., students, graduates, local farmers and crafters, worked together and grew the organization. As needs were recognized, people found an answer to problems. A famous management consultant attended the group for several days. At the end, he concluded that if the government or a philanthropy ran H.O.M.E. it would cost millions of dollars.

The group reminds me of Dorothy Day's Catholic Worker movement.

In the two sided simple Spring Appeal Letter written by Ms. Lucy Poulin, she lists the numbers in the various programs they support: Goodness Sake Food Pantry-294 food boxes for 850 individuals; Shelters-11,778 bed nights; Emergency Food Truck-325 individuals from 143 families received boxes. Soup kitchen- 6,480 hot lunches. More than a dozen more programs plus volunteer hours are noted.

Many thanks to Kathy Baker and husband for their time and love shown to this remarkable community. Kathy said they need bedding, sheets, blankets, towels for the seven shelters they are now providing. She plans to visit in late September. The newsletter will advise you.
